## **The Matinee**

Participants for this year's discussion of Cather's The Troll Garden include:

Mildred R. Bennett, founder of the WCPM and author of The World of Willa Cather will serve as moderator for the afternoon. Mrs. Bennett, recognized as the foremost authority on Willa Cather, served as President of WCPM for 21 years and continues to assist scholars from all over the world with their research.

Ella Cather Lewis is the daughter of Jack Cather, Willa's youngest brother. She received her M.A. in Education and Speech Communication at USC. She currently is with the speech department at Long Beach City College where she specializes in public speaking.

Margaret Goodman-Malamuth received her B.S. in English from Bemidji State University and her M.A. in English from Baylor University. She served as Associate Professor of English at Long Beach City College from 1955 to 1976. She is now on personal leave.

Dr. Bruce P. Baker has served as a WCPM board member from 1975 to the present. He received his M.A. from the University of Omaha and his Ph.D. from Texas Christian University. Currently Professor of English at The University of Nebraska, Omaha, he served as Fulbright Lecturer in English at Kabul University, Afghanistan in 1976.

#### The Troll Garden

"All S.S. McClure could think of to do for her after he published **The Troll Garden** was to offer her a job as one of his editors on **McClures' Magazine**, where she worked hard for six mortal years before it seems to have occurred to her that she was not being a writer, after all, which was what she had started out for."—Katherine Ann Porter, afterward to **The Troll Garden**.

Published in 1905, Willa Cather's first volume of seven short stories will set the theme for the Panel Discussion at the 23rd Annual Cather Spring Conference.

## **Curator Appointed**

The Board recently appointed Ann E. Billesbach, Curator of the WCPM. Ann, a native of Central City, Nebraska, received her B.A. in English from the University of Nebraska in 1975. She attended Cooperstown Graduate Programs in American Folk Culture and Museum Studies, completing course work for her M.A. in 1977. Ann comes to the WCPM following a National Endowment for The Humanities Internship with The Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio.

#### **Conference Banquet**

The 23rd Annual Spring Conference Banquet will honor those who have given time and financial assistance to the WCPM through the years. With such devoted support the Memorial has continued its ever-increasing activities, culminating once again in the Annual Cather Spring Conference.

Tom Allan, roving reporter for "The Omaha World Herald" will emcee the program which includes several selections sung by performing artists Linda Phillips and Fritz Mountford. Roger Welsch, folklorist at UNL, will serve as guest speaker for the evening.

#### Welsch Banquet Speaker

Roger L. Welsch, noted Nebraska folklorist, will be guest speaker for the Spring Conference Banquet. Welsch is currently Associate Professor of English and Anthropology at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. In 1977 he received an award for distinguished teaching from the University and State Legislature.

Welsch is the author of several books including Sod Walls: The Story of the Nebraska Sod House, Shingling the Fog and Other Plains Lies and Tall-Tale Postcards: A Pictorial History and has released a recording of Nebraska pioneer folksongs entitled Sweet Nebraska Land.

## **Performing Artist — Fritz Mountford**

Fritz Mountford, a native of Red Cloud and graduate of Hastings College, will provide vocal entertainment for the Annual Cather Banquet.

Mountford, a vocalist with The Fred Waring Pennsylvanians, also serves as director of The Waring Blenders, a specialty group with the Waring tour. He is an accomplished choral arranger and enjoys teaching as a conductor at The Waring Workshop.

#### Performing Artist — Linda Phillips

Linda Phillips, soprano, of New York City, will be guest soloist at the Cather Spring Conference, May 6, 1978. Miss Phillips will sing Willa Cather's ''The Hawthorne Tree.''

Linda Phillips is a native of Red Cloud, Nebraska. A graduate of Indiana University, she has been an apprentice artist with the Santa Fe Opera Company and performed leading roles with the St. Paul Opera, the National Opera Company, the Syracuse Symphony, the Kansas City Lyric, and the Opera Orchestra of New York.

In April, she will sing the role of Musetta in ''La Boheme'' with the Opera Association of Great Miami, and will appear April 24th as soloist at Bethany College, Lindsborg, Kansas, in Vaughan William's ''Dona Nobis Pacem'' with the Kansas City Philharmonic Orchestra.

#### "Into the Morning"

Because of popular demand, the film ''Into the Morning: Willa Cather's America'' will again be shown during the 1978 Spring Conference.

Produced in 1975 by WNET-TV, New York, the film makes use of Red Cloud settings and people as well as those of the Southwest in its portrayal of Willa Cather's life and works.

The times and location of the showing will be posted at registration.

#### Church Services

The Grace Episcopal Church will again open its doors to worshipers the morning of May 6. A Mass will be offered at 9:00 A.M. as a part of the Spring Conference.

The Reverend Dr. William A. Johnson, Canon Theologian of The Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine in New York City and Professor of Philosophy and the History of Ideas at Brandeis University, will Celebrate the Eucharist.

He will be assisted by the Reverend Brent Bohlke, Chaplain at St. Mark's on the campus and instructor of English at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln.

Both Dr. Johnson and Rev. Bohlke are Cather scholars and have generously offered their services for the Spring Conference.

The St. Juliana Choir, an ecumenical group of Red Cloud people, will provide the music for the service. The Choir is under the direction of John English, music instructor at Red Cloud Community Schools.

Mrs. Bernard Sprague will provide accompaniment on the pump organ.

## **Pavelka Farmhouse Nominated**

The Ántonia Farmhouse, setting for a part of Willa Cather's **My Ántonia**, is being nominated for listing in The National Register of Historic Places.

The farmhouse, home of Annie and John Pavelka, was deeded to the Memorial by Mr. and Mrs. Haldine Johnson in 1976.

In Book V, ''Cuzak's Boys,'' of **My Antonia**, Cather recreates the Pavelka farm of the 1900's.

"Set back on a swell of land at my right, I saw a wide farm-house, with a red barn and an ash grove, and cattle-yards in front that sloped down to the highroad . . . The roof was so steep that the eaves were not much above the forest of tall hollyhocks, now brown and in seed. Through July, Antonia said, the house was buried in them; the Bohemians, I remembered, always planted hollyhocks. The front yard was enclosed by a thorny locust hedge, and at the gate grew two silvery, mothlike trees of the mimosa family."

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the Nation's cultural resources worthy of preservation. Listing in The National Register makes property owners eligible to be considered for federal grants-in-aid for historic preservation through state programs.

#### N.S.H.S. Merger

LB567, authorizing the acquisition of the properties and operation of The Willa Cather Pioneer Memorial by the Nebraska State Historical Society, received the final approval of the legislature on March 10, 1978. The bill awaits the Governor's signature.

Senators Bereuter, Kahle, and Warner, sponsors of the bill, are to be commended for their continuing interest and efforts in promoting the legislative approval of the merger.

The Willa Cather Pioneer Memorial and Educational Foundation will continue and expand its activities as set forth in it's charter — ''assisting scholarships in the field of humanities and perpetuating an interest throughout the world in the work of Willa Cather.'' (Late note: Governor Exon signed LB567 March 16, 1978.)

#### Preface to In Time and Place

The WCPM recently received a copy of In Time and Place: Some Origins of American Fiction by Floyd C. Watkins, Professor of English at Emory University.

Watkins spent three weeks in Red Cloud in 1975 while doing research for his book.

In Time and Place, explores "cultural and historical and geographical background and their effects on fiction." His Cather chapters deal with My Antonia and Death Comes for the Archbishop.
