Spring Conference Theme is ONE OF OURS

Cather's Pulitzer Prize winning novel of 1922, **One of Ours** is the thematic book for the annual WCPM Spring Conference to be held in Red Cloud on Saturday, May 1, 1976. This book's discussion of American values and its story of a Nebraska farm boy who is killed fighting in World War I make it appropriate for the Bicentennial year. We have planned a full day of entertaining and educational events.

A One of Ours mood will be set for the conference banquet by music from World War I. Then, the program will be a premiere showing of the documentary filmed in Cather country last summer by WNET-TV, New York, Great American Authors: Willa Cather. The movie features local "actors" and familiar locales.

The afternoon discussion of the book is called "The Passing Show," the title of Cather's newspaper column criticizing the arts in the 1890's. Our program will feature a short review of the book by Bernice Slote, Ron Hull, JoAnna Lathrop, and Rich Wilson. A critical assessment of the work will follow with the following professional discussants: Sister Lucy Schneider, Marymount College, Kansas; Dr. Sue Rosowski, University of Nebraska-Lincoln; Dr. Patricia Yongue, Houston (Texas) University; and Dr. Robert Harwick, Hastings College, Nebraska.


In spite of inflation, the conference price will remain the same as last year, \$15.00. In addition there is an early-payment price of only \$14. For the first time this year you can purchase separate tickets for each of the four major events to accommodate those who cannot stay all day. Prices are **One of Ours** tour (bus furnished), \$4; lunch, \$2.50; "The Passing Show," \$2; and banquet, \$6.50.

STUDENT SPECIAL

We are urging teachers and students to take advantage of the special prices offered them this year. All high school and college students can buy a special packet which includes the tour, lunch, and "The Passing Show" for the pre-registration price of \$6 (saving \$2.50). Teachers who bring their students may purchase this packet for themselves as well. In student groups of ten or more, admission to only "The Passing Show" is \$1 each (again, teachers who bring their students, may pay their own admission at a student rate).

Pittsburgh Circle Meets

The Pittsburgh Cather Circle held its annual December 7 meeting, but met again a week later to view "Willa Cather Remembered," the film produced by Nebraska Educational Television Network which pre-

miered in Red Cloud last May 3 at the twentieth anniversary spring conference.

WCPM Director JoAnna Lathrop was in Pittsburgh for the December 14 meeting. Her hostess was Jeanne Shaffer, a member of the Cather Circle. JoAnna had tea with the David Mertz family at 1180 Murray Hill (formerly the McClung mansion where Willa Cather lived) and Board member Helen Cather Southwick entertained JoAnna for lunch at her home, where JoAnna saw the Fechin portrait of Helen's "Aunt Willa" and other Cather mementos.

AASLH Consultant Visits Museum

In January, Helmuth J. Naumer, Executive Director of the Ft. Worth Museum of Science and History, spent two and one half days in Red Cloud analyzing the WCPM and making recommendations for the future. In his twelve-page report, Naumer commended us for acquiring and preserving truly valuable Cather objects. He commented that we have a subject and purpose of international interest and importance. He lauded "The very real attempt to develop a professional museum and historic restoration," and judged "the work has been done with quality and love."

Mr. Naumer's comments and recommendations contained in his written report are serving as invaluable guidelines while we formulate and carryout both short and long-range plans.

Mr. Naumer's services as a visiting consultant were made possible by a grant from the American Association for State and Local History.

WCPM Serves Students

The heavy fall schedule of student tours (almost one a day during October) ended abruptly with the succession of Thanksgiving blizzards. Even though the museum is officially closed during the winter, a large number of visitors—individuals, small groups, and high school and college classes—toured the WCPM facilities from November to March. Others continued their study of Cather after enlisting our help by mail.

Then Dr. Robert Harwick's Willa Cather inter-term seminar at Hastings College met one day each week in Red Cloud during January for a series of lectures, tours, films, and discussions, tailored to enhance their study of Cather novels and short stories. Park College of Missouri sent students in January for a two-day study period here. Scheduled for early April is a class from Mid-Plains Technical Community College of North Platte.

Spring also brings another wave of student tours. The April and May calendars are already almost filled.

Cather Happenings

The WCPM provided the Epicurean Society of America with three recipes used in Willa Cather's home to be included in their 1976 publication, A Culinary Tour of Great American Homes, by Helen Futch.

Board member Bruce Baker and his family are now in Afghanistan where Dr. Baker is the Fulbright lecturer in American literature and history at the University of Kabul. He will return to his post as professor of English at the University of Nebraska-Omaha in January, 1977.

Most visitors come to look at Willa Cather's country. Robert Beadell came to listen. Beadell is writing the music for **Out to the Wind**, a musical drama in two acts, adapted from Willa Cather's "Eric Hermannson's Soul." Virginia Faulkner, board member of the WCPM, is writing the libretto. The work will be produced by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln School of Music sometime during 1976.

literally the home of the John Pavelka family. Mrs. Pavelka (Annie) is transformed by Cather's art to Antonia Shimerda Cuzak, heroine of the novel My Antonia.

One of the few houses from the pioneer era still standing, this house is known world-wide because it is the background for "Cuzak's Boys," Book V of My Antonia. Here the prototype of Antonia, "earth mother of the plains," ("a rich mine of life, like the founders of early races,") and her children lived. It was from this fruit cave that Jim Burden watched "a veritable explosion of life out of the dark cave into the sunlight."

Plans for preserving the exterior of the Antonia house are underway. New shingles for the house are being provided by the Certain-teed Products Corporation. This is the first and only Nebraska site chosen for the company's program of restoration of Great American Landmarks. National advertising will feature before and after pictures as the new roof goes on the Antonia farm house this spring.

Willa Cather's Birthday Celebrated

RED CLOUD—As announced in the Fall Newsletter, open house was held in all the WCPM restored buildings on December 7, 1975, to commemorate Willa Cather's birthday. More than one hundred people attended on the only sunshiny Sunday afternoon in December.

NEW YORK—On December 8 in Greenwich Village a crowd of Cather admirers gathered in the snow at number 5 Bank Street to dedicate a bronze plaque on the building where Willa Cather lived for fourteen years.

The plaque reads: "The noted American author Willa Cather lived on the second floor of 5 Bank Street on this site from 1913 until the house was torn down in 1927. During this period she produced many of her most important literary works, including THE SONG OF THE LARK [1915]; MY ANTONIA [1918]; YOUTH AND THE BRIGHT MEDUSA [1920]; ONE OF OURS

[1922]; APRIL TWILIGHTS AND OTHER POEMS [1923]; A LOST LADY [1923]; THE PROFESSOR'S HOUSE [1925]; MY MORTAL ENEMY [1926]; and DEATH COMES FOR THE ARCHBISHOP [1927].

Willa Cather Pioneer Memorial, Red Cloud, Nebraska"

Whitney North Seymour, Jr., who conceived and funded the commemorative project, was in charge of the dedication program and was one of the speakers.

Alfred A. Knopf, Cather's publisher, in one of his rare public appearances, reminisced about his long friendship with "Miss Cather."

Board member Lucia Woods, representing the WCPM, presented a complete set of the Cather books written at 5 Bank Street to the Jefferson Market Courthouse Library just around the corner.

"Willa Cather's Red Cloud," a collection of photographs by Gabriel Seymour, was on exhibition in the library during December in conjunction with the plaque dedication and birthday celebration.
